



Separated Families – polling summary
July 4-6 2008 – representative sample of 1021 adults across Great Britain

Q1. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements?:

a) When parents separate, services tend to focus on practical issues such as housing, child maintenance, contact and custody but don't address emotional support for children

Net agree: 75% (strongly, 44%)

b) More should be done to support children when their parents are going through a separation

Net agree: 84% (strongly, 60%)

c) More should be done to support parents who are going through a separation

Net agree: 71% (strongly, 43%)

Q2. How much, if at all, do you think the following affect children whose parents are going through a separation? Please use a scale of 1 to 5, where 1 means affects a lot, and 5 means does not affect at all

a) Parents arguing with each other in front of the child

Net affects: 76% (65% affects a lot)

b) The child having to move between different houses

Net affects: 63% (46% affects a lot)

c) Losing contact with one parent

Net affects: 74% (64% affects a lot)

d) The financial cost of separation

Net affects 54% (38% affects a lot)

Q3. Thinking about the services offered to families during a separation. To what extent do you agree or disagree with the following statements?:

a) Children aren't encouraged to talk about their parent's separation

Net agree 59% (strongly, 36%)

b) No direct support is given to stop/prevent conflicts between the parents when around their children

Net agree 60% (strongly, 33%)

c) Children should be a priority when parents are managing a separation

Net agree 93% (strongly, 80%)

Q4. If services were to be more geared towards the needs of children during a separation, how important or unimportant do you think each of the following should be?

a) More support to prevent arguments between parents

Net important 85% (very important, 57%)

b) More opportunities for children's voices to be heard

Net important 93% (very important, 70%)

c) Family counselling

Net important 90% (very important, 60%)

d) More access for parents to practical and legal advice in sorting contact arrangements etc

Net important 93% (very important, 65%)

e) More access for parents to practical and legal advice in sorting out money e.g. child maintenance

Net important 94% (very important, 69%)
