
UK fathers in their first year

New dads are involved

Fathers' presence at their babies' birth, and involvement in routine caregiving after it, have increased enormously over the last half-century and more.

By the time their baby reaches 9 months old, a third of mothers say their partner does as much, or more, childcare as they do themselves.



Check out the graph and timeline below...

1950

8% of fathers attend the birth

1959

51% never get up to baby at night 43% never change a nappy 30% help at home after the birth

1979

22% never get up to baby at night 11% never change a nappy 95% help at home after the birth



1980 91% attend the birth

1990

39% feed infant 'often' 32% bathe infant 'often'

2000

53% feed baby at least once a day 57% change baby at least once a day

2010

65% change nappies 'a great deal' 72% respond 'a great deal' to their crying babies
